MARK'S MUSINGS

I'm not the biggest fan of Ash Wednesday. There, I've said it.

I realize among Christians I'm in the minority about this. Every congregation I've ever served embraced it as an important beginning to their Lenten observance, a way of acknowledging their willingness for repentance and to draw closer to God. And, I'm all for that.

That's a joyful thing, right? Why then the whole doom and gloom attitude people often bring to the season of Lent, visually displayed as a smudgy dark cross-shaped ash on the forehead? Seems a misunderstanding of Christian discipleship, at least as I understand it, in any season. Jesus teaches *not* to be gloomy and doomy but joyful and hopeful. It's awfully hard to convey joy and hope to the surrounding non-Christian culture while sporting those cross-shaped ashes.

But that's just my opinion. One of my best friends, a good Roman Catholic, would definitely disagree with me on all this. And maybe you do, too. But for others, like me, who are a little uneasy with the whole practice, I have good news. The upcoming Ash Wednesday service we share each year with the folks over at the Green Mountain Presbyterian congregation is offering some other alternatives to the traditional imposition of ashes. (Don't worry, though, they're still doing that too!)

The whole evening begins @ 5:30 p.m. on February 26, with a pancake supper. Have you ever known a room full of pancakes and bacon not to be an atmosphere of joyful celebration? The Ash Wed service then follows @ 7:00 p.m. in which Pastor Gretchen Wilson has constructed a worship experience that is suggesting the ashes be seen as a symbol of the power of Jesus' love to burn up beyond recognition the 'old things/ways' that no longer serve us, and free us to live into a new life/way. And if ashes aren't your thing, there are other options that will be made available, with one in particular that really intrigues me: you are instructed to write whatever it is (anger, fear, resentment, etc.) that you would like to release on a slip of rice paper and then drop it into a bowl of water to disintegrate, symbolizing the greater power of God's love to subsume the obstacles we so often put in our own way that inhibit us from experiencing a fuller, richer relationship with the Creator and creation, even our own selves. Gloom/doom prohibited.

I hope you'll join us on Ash Wednesday, February 26, for a joyful time of receiving pancakes, followed by a healing time to release any obstacles between you and Spirit, and thus your best, truest self; and to be drenched in something even sweeter than maple syrup- the amazing grace and boundless love of God revealed in Christ Jesus.

May you welcome God, in this season of Lent, to sweep the chimney of your heart free from ashes and make some room for a new fire. *Pastor Mark*

In 2013 Pastor Jean Schwien organized a "Strategic Planning Committee" comprised of approximately 20 members from all age groups, interests, and committees. At the initial meeting, ideas were offered regarding changes and improvements to our facility. At a following meeting, these ideas were grouped under the titles in the following report. 
