MARK'S MUSINGS

So... I was idling in my car, waiting for the light to turn green, when another driver pulled up alongside of me, pulling her mask down at intervals to take a drag off her cigarette. I found the juxtaposition interesting, while at the same time being careful not to assume too much. Perhaps she was wearing the mask to avoid incurring a fine. Maybe she was just seconds away from her destination- work, gas station, grocery store, etc.- and had just put

it on before deciding on a quick smoke. It's possible, I guess, that she might have just loved the feel of cotton against her face or was sporting the lovely, colorful design on her mask as a fashion accessory. Who knows? My guess is that she was simply taking precautions against contracting the coronavirus, which is the primary purpose of wearing these masks in the first place. And if that's correct, then I can't help but wonder about the curious disconnect between donning a mask to avoid disease while toking on a cigarette, known beyond a shadow of a doubt to court disease!

When the light turned green, we both headed off to our respective destinations, parting company probably forever. But I found myself using the encounter to contemplate my own moments of disconnect between Jesus' life and mine. Jesus had a pure and absolute knowledge of himself and his world and was accountable for his own decisions rather than blaming others. Jesus understood himself to be more than only his physical body or emotions, knowing instead who he truly was in the Spirit. Jesus never condemned himself or others, and forgave everyone, including himself. Jesus was fully self-realized, and in complete union (co-[m]union) with God, the Creator, and all of God's creation. Jesus taught love, practiced love, was/is Love.

When we pray the prayer he taught his apostles, when we read and meditate on his teaching, when we affirm ourselves as his disciples, do our subsequent actions and words and even our innermost private thoughts reveal the truth of our convictions... or are we just blowing smoke? And, remember, just as second-hand cigarette smoke has been proven to be harmful to the surrounding crowd, and not just to your own health, your practice of the Christian life also affects everyone else around you. Even that anonymous person idling in the car next to you at a stoplight.

The Trustees have been busy this summer with several outdoor repair projects. The wooden supports under the play pad were rotting, making the structure unsafe. We removed the Trex® top boards and the rotten posts and now have replaced the posts in fresh cement. Next to be installed will be the new framework and then the top. The play pad covers the drainage pond catching roof rain and snow melt.

It has a drainpipe running under the playground that exits below the garden into a ditch headed towards Cedar St., and that drainage has been improved.

The second project was to prevent rain from the parking lot from flowing down into the townhouses to the north. We had received complaints about this problem lately because the ditch that diverted this water had filled up over the years. 6x8 timbers were installed along the rear edge of the parking lot, and this water now also flows into the play pad ditch.

Our dumpster enclosure fence was due for a makeover. Old fence boards and support 2x4s needed to be replaced. The gate was falling apart, and the old structure was an eyesore!

Our custodian, James O'Toole, has been repainting the parking lot stripes. He also replaced the columbarium fountain water pump. The restrooms have gotten new paint and the Fireside Room restroom, and the daycare entrance hallway has new flooring. The flooring installation was no cost to GMUMC.

So we keep working to maintain our property, indoors and out. Because we didn't have Grubby Sunday work time both Spring and Fall, volunteers are so appreciated to work on their own schedules on bush and tree trimming, trash pickup, etc. Anyone who can help on Wednesdays, Fridays, or Saturdays from 9:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. with finishing the play pad would receive extra credit! 
