As you contemplate your decisions, please don't get 'tricked' by what the candidates are promising, but instead 'treat' yourself to an honest assessment of their actual behavior & policy decisions on record, and to a particular consideration of the compatibility of their leadership and vision for America with the kind of reign Jesus campaigned for- the hospitable reception of immigrants, a just structure of society w/ regards to people of all races and economic circumstances, responding to enemies with non-violent retaliation, and a myriad of other issues which are clearly addressed in the gospels. As a Christian disciple, will every vote you cast honor the teaching and example of Jesus, God's gift of unconditional love to the entire world?

What Sign Would Jesus Carry?

The answer to that question says more about the person providing the answer than it does about Jesus. I haven't the slightest idea. (I'd guess no sign at all – the way He lived and taught *was* the sign.) As a devout introvert I've never been drawn to the visibility of standing on a street corner with a bit of poster board proclaiming this or that. But for the past month I've joined a dedicated group of diverse "corner-standing" souls flying under the banner, "Lakewood for Justice, Equity, Diversity, & Inclusion" which is in "solidarity" with "Black Lives Matter." Those last three words can generate *a whole lot* of preconceptions – especially in those mind's animating white bodies. *I can only speak from my lone, pale experience but these assumptions often fall into three categories:*

- 1. If I say "Black Lives Matter" I'm saying all other lives don't matter (especially white lives). *False*. Of course *all lives matter* that's the point but there remains in our culture a conscious and unconscious bias based on the fiction of race. Beyond rhetoric, all lives have not mattered *equally* in our country. It's an awkward analogy, and many versions are made, but if I call you up and say, "my car's broken down" and you respond "all cars matter" where does that leave each of us? It leaves me alone. Together we can do better.
- 2. If I say "Black Lives Matter" I'm anti-police. <u>False.</u> Many of us support giving the police the tools and training to do their difficult jobs and many departments do just that. I can attest it's a difficult and, at times, dangerous job where much is asked and much expected (often too much). To openly examine instances of potential bias & abuse, to seek equity in justice, and to weigh varying models of public safety (see support services like CAHOOTS in Eugene, Oregon and Denver's own recent STAR efforts) these are ways to *build* community, *share* challenges, *create* safer streets and yes, support women and men in law enforcement in their work.
- 3. If I say "Black Lives Matter" I'm a Marxist. *False*. Sigh. You actually could be many things the desire for a better more inclusive way forward doesn't require a particular -ist, -ism, or even an -ology. It just requires a recognition of our common humanity.

So does standing on a street corner with a sign make a difference? I don't know. But the process of getting to that corner — the conversations and the listening done — I believe does make a difference. Setting aside the seductions of ego and ideology, *don't we all just want our lives to matter?* — and openly realize for that to happen, *then each life must matter?* But if we take this "mattering" seriously, there is a persistent ache in how to make it so. And perhaps that "ache," when shared together, with honesty and vulnerability, is the source of our justice, humanity, and hope. All lives matter — it's at the heart of our faith traditions and civic values — but it's a truth that only appears if we *work together*.
