To better days ahead, my friends. Merry, Merry Christmas and a very Happy & Healthy New Year!



#### FROM THE TRUSTEES

# Green Mountain United Methodist Church (GMUMC) Trustees 2020 Project Report

- GMUMC suspended all church services and in-person meetings and activities beginning mid-March due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Trustees provided hand sanitizer dispensers throughout the buildings for staff and others to use during these months. Signs regarding masks and other safety measures are posted on entry doors and other areas. Trustees have reopening protocols planned for when it is determined to be safe to open again by the State and Mountain Sky Conference.
- The de-laminated plywood siding area above the original stained glass on the south side of the west building was replaced.
- A curb of 6x8 treated pressure-treated timbers was constructed along one-half of the north edge of the parking lot to
  prevent water runoff from draining into the townhouse area below. Runoff water is directed into a swale below the
  garden that leads toward Cedar Drive.
- The play pad structure in the playground over the catch basin for the roof runoff and east and north-east sides of the building had to be completely removed and reconstructed.
  - The understructure had rotting timbers and support posts. Most of the concrete holding the support posts had freeze cracks. The entire wood structure had to be totally replaced. Pressure-treated lumber was used for the entire support structure and support posts. Posts were set in new concrete.
  - Existing roof drainpipes that emptied into the pit were extended to the concrete drainage pit in the center. A 4-foot-long drain trough along the pad edge where the pad is against the sidewalk was also installed, and a French drain was installed around the inside edge of the pit to collect rain ground water. Both send water directly to the concrete drainage pit. The reason for this was to minimize the amount of mud being washed into the concrete drainage pit which sends the water out into a drain line that runs below and along the daycare driveway to the swale below the garden that directs the water towards Cedar Drive. Formerly all drainage emptied at the edge of the play pad and flowed through the mud to the low point where the drain was located, collecting mud, and clogging the pit and the drainpipe to the swale.
  - The old Trex top of the play pad has a 20-year life so it was carefully marked for reuse, saving the budget a substantial amount. (Cost of Trex materials in 2010 was \$6,000)
  - Demolition and Construction was all done by volunteer labor.
- Fluorescent troffers in Fellowship Hall, the kitchen, west building upper hallways, and lower east building hallways were retrofitted with LED lighting. Many of the areas now have motion sensors. (Memorial gift)
- The Tiny Hearts Academy daycare lease was extended through May 2032. The daycare has continued to operate throughout 2020.
- Restrooms in the west building and Fireside Room were painted. The kitchen and upper west hallway were painted. A new sink was installed in the women's upper west bathroom. Four new toilets were installed due to unrepairable leaks in the tanks. The playground fence posts were reinforced due to high wind damage.
- New flooring was installed in the daycare entrance hall and Fireside Room restroom. (Material and labor donations)



#### **FINANCE COMMITTEE**

For the month of November our income was \$27,582.69, and our expense were -\$29,211.98. Our overall balance for the year, as of the end of November is -\$41,230.54. As you can see, we are in dire straits, due to the most difficult of years. The Finance Committee would like to make a plea to all, that if you are able to give some extra offerings this month, to help with the huge deficit, it would be greatly appreciated. Don't forget about our new online donation option on our website, which can be easier for some. And as always, thank you for your continued financial support of GMUMC.
