Mark's Musings

The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. preached that "The ultimate measure of a person is not where they stand in moments of comfort and convenience, but where they stand in moments of challenge and controversy." I'm writing this* in the aftermath of the storming of the Capitol building by a mob of former President Trump's supporters and, in particular, having just viewed video excerpts of persons directing their anger towards members of Congress (and, by association, persons like myself and many of you who did not vote for Mr. Trump.) I was, frankly, shocked to hear shouts of "Heads on pikes," and "String 'em up!" as well as witnessing racist symbols on flags and articles of clothing, like the one man wearing a t-shirt with the caption, Camp Auschwitz. "This is not your America," one person yelled. "It's our America."

My initial reaction was fear. I'm not scared of much; but mobs are right at the top of my list. Others expressed sorrow and even despair for what the future might further bring. And then, unfortunately, some began to fire back cries of angry retaliation and character denigration towards the rioters.

Until our own George Lee voiced an authentically Christian response, a quest for understanding and ultimately reconciliation of the Trump supporters. George, apparently, has friends on the 'other side,' as most of us do. My own mother is a huge Trump fan, which has unfortunately created a rift in the otherwise good relationship she once had with my youngest brother's wife, an Austin, TX liberal. Both are equally stubborn, unyielding not only in their political ideologies, but more importantly, in their unwillingness to listen to one another in an attempt to gain understanding of why they hold their respective opinions. I guess they are both waiting for each other to change their minds and come around to the other's way of thinking. Given the track record for that among both sides of issues like abortion, capital punishment, gun control, etc.., I suspect it's going to be a long wait.

George's way, however (and I'm sure he would much rather me title it *Jesus' way*), holds the key to transformation for both, even in the absence of complete agreement. During Rev. King's prior visit to the Illinois Wesleyan University campus in 1961, he gave an interview to WJBC reporter Don Newberg, addressing the angry, violent mob of his own day: "We will match your capacity to inflict suffering by our capacity to endure suffering. We will meet your physical force with soul force. Do to us what you will, and we will still love you. We cannot in all good conscience obey your unjust laws because non-cooperation with evil is as much a moral obligation as is cooperation with good. And so, throw us in jail, and as difficult as that is, we will still love you. Bomb our homes and threaten our children and as difficult as it is, we will still love you. Send your hooded perpetrators and violence into our communities at the midnight hours and drag us out on some wayside road and beat us and leave us half-dead and we will still love you. But be assured that we will wear you down by our capacity to suffer. And one day we will win our freedom, but we will not only win freedom for ourselves. We will so appeal to your heart and your conscience, that we will win you in the process. And our victory will be a double victory. This is the meaning of the nonviolent creed. This is the meaning of the nonviolent ethic." (If you have time, a reading of the entire interview is

further enlightening.) The ultimate measure of our Christian character is being revealed right now, in this time of tremendous challenge and controversy. What difference would it make if instead of denigrating the rioters as bad people, we instead joined George in a search for understanding the underlying hurt and frustration that led to the violent anger? (This does not mitigate the legal consequences incurred in breaking the law.) I offer this as one way of observing and honoring this upcoming month of Black History, so much of which is steeped in examples and models of Christian discipleship under tremendous distress.

May the peace of Christ, which surpasses our understanding, bring healing to us all,

There is no power for change greater than a community discovering what it cares about.

Margaret J Wheatley

It's hard to write anything with certainty these days. A plan, based on a prediction of a probability, of what's possible...is problematic. What will the world look like even one week from now? So, I tap the keys assuming three givens: 1. Masks, 2. Physical distancing, and 3. Hand washing. (What passes as a second Holy Trinity in a pandemic.) But on the question, are we "in" church or "out" I won't venture a guess. But with prudent, continuing precautions and the roll out of vaccines the proverbial "light at the end of the tunnel" – though flickering – grows closer. In this anxious interim, I've pondered and pursued, in our zoom groups and in private conversations, the question, "what will we learn from all this and what changes will we make to create a new, improved normal?" When the urgent preoccupation for safety and survival fades, will we take a collective deep breath and build a broader, deeper sense of community? Will we pack up and move out of our comfort zones and realize this whole Jesus "call" is a whole lot more radical. The Call of Christ was not delayed or diminished by a virus – physical church attendance, budget figures, and a building – though great – are not necessities in responding to the "call." Two ingredients are essential – the vulnerability of connection and the courage of commitment. If the only thing that holds us together is a weekly gathering, money, and four walls then we're following convention not Christ. COVID-19 is an in-your-face reminder of the reality of our physical and emotional fragility and our reliance on each other. In short, our need for meaningful, purposeful community. That process of creative connection needs a radical "rethink" – with action – as a faith community, a nation, and a world. Amidst our denial, deep grief, and clinging to "what was" we have an opportunity to get about the work needed to fashion "what will be." What does that look like? Together, we decide.

FROM THE TRUSTEES

Back in January 2020 the Trustees discussed safety concerns with the edging on the play pad structure, located in the playground. It is built over a catch basin for collecting runoff from the roof and part of the building grounds.

What was expected to be a simple repair job was not completed until the end of 2020. As it turned out the entire structure had to be completely removed and rebuilt because the understructure had rotting timbers and support posts. Most of the concrete holding the support posts had freeze cracks and had to be replaced or reenforced. Then another issue arose-the pressure-treated lumber needed for the structure frame took over 2 months to procure because the manufacturer was shut down because of a COVID-19 outbreak in their facility.

To eliminate future problems changes were made. The roof drainpipes that dump water into the pit were extended to the concrete drainage pit in the center. A 4-foot-long drain trough along the pad edge where the pad is against the sidewalk was installed, and a French drain was installed around the inside edge of the pit to collect rain ground water. All drains now send water directly into the concrete drainage pit. This minimizes the amount of mud being washed into the drainage Pit and then into the swale (located below the garden at the edge of the parking lot). The swale directs the water towards Cedar Street avoiding the condos and property below GMUMC.

The Trex® top on the play pad was installed 10 years ago and has a 20-year life so it was carefully removed and marked for reuse on the new structure which saved the budget a substantial amount (cost of the Trex® materials in 2010 was \$6,000). A special new feature was also added. The playground resident rabbit now has two permanent access holes to her under-play pad cozy home!

Demolition and Construction was all done by volunteer labor. Ron Bernard donated uncountable hours to overseeing and engineering this project, and the following folks assisted him to get the job done: John Morrison, Mike Coen, Calvin Mukarakate, Doug Wylie, Tom Cummins, Eric, Kendall, & Evan Morrison, James O'Toole, Chuck Thorman, Adam Bernard, Jane Bernard, and James Olson (Ron's son-in-Law). Thanks to all who assisted.

The Garden is growing – even over the winter. Below are pictures taken by garden-friend, Brenda Bronson Walker of the work accomplished this winter. The fence is in (take THAT you pesky rabbits!); the new shed is installed, compost bins and a bench. There is still work to do on the interior garden paths and the upcoming spring/summer professional installation of bricks, a pergola for shade and additional benches in the teaching area by the pollinator garden. We are still in need of signage and have a "dream" of a *little reading library* (in honor of Jefferson County Librarian, church member and benefactor Coralee Brown) at the entrance to the garden.

What we need:

- Garden tools As you start to garden this spring please think of the Garden and donate your used hand tools, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc. We would like to stock the sheds over this spring and be ready for spring planting. Any extra tools will be donated to DUG for other Community Gardens.
- **Bricks** The brick fund raiser is still on going. We anticipate installing the bricks this spring/summer. Please contact Lori Osborn if you would like to purchase a brick, the garden's ongoing fund raiser.
- Labor Contact Jean Arnold if you are available to volunteer to install rabbit barrier below the fence line this spring/summer. I have heard from many of you and have your names, so you do not have to contact me again.

Note: the garden will remain unlocked. Feel free to visit at any time.

- Fund raising Bricks. Lori Osborn will be in contact with you if you have not provided the "words" you want on your bricks. We will be ordering bricks for delivery a few weeks before they are to be installed. If you have not ordered a brick but have been meaning to do so it's not too late. Contact Lori Osborn.
 - You can order bricks at any time to support the garden. The bricks will be installed once the heavy work is done. Please contact Lori

 Place.
 - \$100 per 4 X 8 brick + \$10 for clip art.
 - \$200 per 8 X 8 brick + \$10 for clip art.


