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Mark's Musings

I alternate between news and music on my drive to and from work every day. A little news is plenty, just a few minutes of the headlines, before I switch off CPR's Morning Edition and switch on the 'oldies' station complete, with everything from groovy British invasion to America's garage bands and funky Motown artists- you know, good music.

One morning, right before I got ready to flip the dial off the news and onto the music, I happened to catch a report about the severe toll, beyond social distancing exhaustion, that COVID is now taking on the public. In addition to the death of a half a million Americans, the rates of substance abuse, domestic violence, and suicide are hitting record levels.

In addition to (or as part of) my Christian discipleship, some of you know that I engage in meditation twice daily- the first thing I do when I wake up and the last thing I do before I go to sleep. Research has shown that even the simplest practice of sitting still and resting one's mind for just a few minutes each day has tremendous benefits for our physical, mental, and spiritual well-being.

The instructor that leads a weekly online meditation group I attend recently suggested that meditation can be a silver lining behind the dark social distancing of this pandemic an opportunity in disquise. For example, he writes:

1. Because the lure of social gatherings and a hyperactive social life can sometimes detract our focus and persistent determination to accomplish necessary tasks, there is value in being completely alone, which manifests in increased creativity and productivity. The great tennis champion, Billie Jean King, said that "Pressure is a privilege," and that spending too much time with others can too often actually take away the pressure vital to achieving a breakthrough. Being in the company of others too often directs our attention outward. For a spiritual person, the number one strategy for growth and self-improvement is to turn one's attention inward, deep within oneself, and maximize this introspection as much as possible. So, it's worthwhile examining how we can restructure our lives a bit with a more balanced level of socializing.

- 2. Another benefit to being unable to get together easily with people or attend social events nearby is the increased time available to spend with those who aren't, albeit online. This current situation presents a golden opportunity to rebuild those distant relationships that were neglected pre-COVID.
- 3. In the middle of last year, toilet paper was not the only item on short supply at grocery stores; flour was also flying off the shelves because so many people began baking at home like never before. (i.e., Our own Mark Osborn!) Online courses are booming with instruction on everything from banjo picking to ballroom dancing. Rediscovering hidden talents or creative instincts during this period of social distancing can significantly bring enrichment to one's life.
- 4. Take a hike! No, I don't mean that in the sarcastic sense. We Coloradans, who are fortunate enough to be surrounded by so much natural beauty are already well acquainted with the joy of simply going for a walk in the forested mountains and among the creatures that call it home. And for those who walk far enough, the bonus is a few minutes free from wearing a mask!

My instructor concluded by citing studies that show that in 2020, pollution levels dropped to such an extent that natural wonders, previously not visible for decades, could now be seen from miles away. Perhaps even Mother Earth is voicing her concern that we make better choices for ourselves and the world. While we are still under many of the precautions necessary to eliminate the spread of this terrible pandemic, and before we return to 'the way things were,' is there some positive change you could make in your life, something healthy to emerge from all this sickness?

What have you got to lose- except low self-esteem and high blood pressure, resentment and frustration, loneliness, and boredom?

If there is anything this unwelcome viral visitor has taught us, it's that heroes come in all sizes, shapes, colors, and professions. Who among us thought of the local grocery store checker - though we're always nice and appreciative - as a true, cardcarrying, death-defying Hero? Nurses finally got their hard-won due. But what about that modest wage worker keeping those hospital rooms clean and sanitized – and along the way becoming a familiar, friendly face to the isolated patients. (When I was working in hospitals, I found the cleaning staff a great source of information about my patient's mental and physical wellbeing.) Most of our heroes work for low wages and little respect. We all need to open our eyes to the sad American Caste System that equates money with worth. Those attitudes need to succumb to the viral experience. Over the past year I've come to deeply appreciate the sanity and life-saving worth of those that work in the trenches of our financial system. By now the term "PPP loan" is part of our national alphabet, however, few are aware of the noble souls that turn letters into action. My wife, Marcia, is one of those souls, along with her co-workers. We all have some idea what a Kafkaesque maze a bureaucratic system can be – but can we imagine the stress of a small, local business trying to stay afloat during a pandemic without any, or few, customers – and navigate a byzantine loan process in the hope that money will be a bridge to a better, less-viral, future? Into this 24/7 stress comes the financial services pro who uses knowledge, patience, and I'm sure over-the-counter pain relivers to translate policy and government jargon into real-world relief. Imagine a crisis hotline with heavy regulations and mountains of paperwork - that all needs to be done NOW! It means seven days a week, 7:00 a.m. to 2:00 a.m. workdays (honest) and diplomacy skills that could solve the Middle East crisis. These too are heroes, living from phone call to computer screen to help keep businesses viable and employees with a paycheck. A church would be lucky to be this valuable to the lives of people and the health of the greater community. Ironically, we live in a world that needs true heroes – and blessedly these heroes are everywhere – if we only have the eyes and heart to see.

# Green Mountain United Methodist Church RELAUNCH

#### GMUMC (re)LAUNCH INFORMATION:

- 50 attendees will be allowed initially. That number is based on Jeffco restrictions and may increase as rules are modified.
- Attendees will use the east side of the north steps to enter, the west side to depart. Signs will be used to indicate step direction and remind social distancing. Anyone needing to exit the building before the service must use the west side of the north steps.
- Elevette elevator will not be available.
- There will be a table inside the doors with signs: "Mask Required", "Sanitize Your Hands", "Symptoms of Covid-19", '6 ft.

  Distancing Required". Hand sanitizer and extra masks will be available. Hand sanitizer will also be available for the restroom and narthex areas.
- There will be an additional table with a person to sign-in attendees. This person will keep track of the number of attendees and note contact information for non-members. A non-contact thermometer will be used to check attendees' temperatures.
- Bulletins will be provided.
- The stairwells will be blocked with yellow tape up & down to west bldg., ramp, down to daycare.
- Some of the sanctuary's pews with be blocked with yellow tape advising which areas are not available for seating.
- The Gathering Place will not be available for coffee and socializing. The water fountain will not be available. Nametags will not be needed.
- The Fireside Room restroom will be available.
- Prayer candles can be lit if no other attendee is within 6 ft. of the candle table.
- Sanctuary ceiling fans and sanctuary air handler fans for the heating system will be turned off.
- Hymnals and Bibles will be removed from pews. There will be no congregational singing during the service; however, humming along under your mask with the song leader is acceptable. Words to hymns will be provided in the bulletin.
- The Offering Baskets will not be passed during the service; however, a basket will be provided outside the sanctuary door.

#### Seating/Dismissal:

- Ushers will indicate seating areas to attendees. Family groups can sit together if the 6 ft. distance from others is maintained. Seating will begin from the front.
- Ushers will dismiss attendees beginning at the rear, so distancing is maintained.

Any socializing with friends must be done in the parking lot.

The Garden is growing – even over the winter. Below are pictures taken by garden-friend, Brenda Bronson Walker of the work accomplished this winter. The fence is in (take THAT you pesky rabbits!); the new shed is installed, compost bins and a bench. There is still work to do on the interior garden paths and the upcoming spring/summer professional installation of bricks, a pergola for shade and additional benches in the teaching area by the pollinator garden. We are still in need of signage and have a "dream" of a *little reading library* (in honor of Jefferson County Librarian, church member and benefactor Coralee Brown) at the entrance to the garden.

#### What we need:

- Garden tools As you start to garden this spring please think of the Garden and donate your used hand tools, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc. We would like to stock the sheds over this spring and be ready for spring planting. Any extra tools will be donated to DUG for other Community Gardens.
- **Bricks** The brick fund raiser is still on going. We anticipate installing the bricks this spring/summer. Please contact Lori Osborn if you would like to purchase a brick, the garden's ongoing fund raiser.
- Labor Contact Jean Arnold if you are available to volunteer to install rabbit barrier below the fence line this spring/summer. I have heard from many of you and have your names, so you do not have to contact me again.

Note: the garden will remain unlocked. Feel free to visit at any time.

- Fund raising Bricks. Lori Osborn will be in contact with you if you have not provided the "words" you want on your bricks. We will be ordering bricks for delivery a few weeks before they are to be installed. If you have not ordered a brick but have been meaning to do so it's not too late. Contact Lori Osborn.
  - You can order bricks at any time to support the garden. The bricks will be installed once the heavy work is done. Please contact Lori Osborn (lorioho@icloud.com or 303-986-8802) to purchase a brick. Order forms are on the program table outside the Gathering Place.

    - \$200 per 8 X 8 brick + \$10 for clip art.

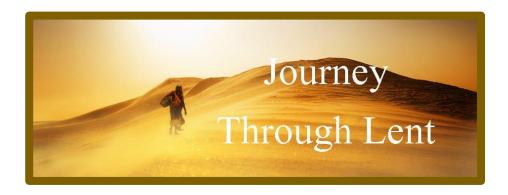

And from Gary himself: "Thanks, GMUMC, for all of the wonderful cards I received for my 80th birthday. GMUMC is like family".

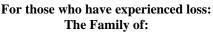
