### Mark's Musings

Candy canes have held their own over the years, both as a sweet seasonal treat and also as lovely Christmas tree decorative ornaments. We had a dog several years ago that used to gaze longingly (and drool a bit, too) at the red and white stripped candy

canes hanging on the branches beyond his reach. Those of you with small dogs, and kids, are already familiar with the necessity of placing candy canes at a safe elevation. But I'm guessing that not all of you know the story behind the Christmas candy cane:

A candy maker in Indiana wanted to create a candy that would double as a treat and a witness to his Christian faith, so he began with a stick of pure white, hard candy- white to symbolize the Virgin Birth and the sinless nature of Jesus, and hard to represent the Solid Rock upon which the Church is founded, as well as the firm assurance of the promise of God. The candy was then shaped into a shepherd's staff to represent Jesus as our Good Shepherd guiding his wandering lambs back into the safety and fellowship of the fold. Thinking that the candy was still somewhat plain, the inspired candy maker finished the cane by staining it with the red stripes representing the scourging Jesus received and by which we are healed.

Most folks are probably unaware of the deeper significance of the candy cane. But the witness is still there for those who have eyes to see, and ears to hear... and tongues to taste!

You are invited to participate in going "Low" through our Sunday morning classes as well as daily devotionals right up to Christmas.



### **Action Center Donations and Volunteer Opportunities**


The Action Center is now taking all seasonal clothing donations and also donations of blankets and linens as well as non-perishable food. Visit their website for donation drive thru times.

### Did you know?

Things about **Green Mountain United Methodist Church** you might find interesting and/or useful to know.

CHAPTER 4 – GMUMC INFORMATION in no particular order of importance.

- The beautiful Christmas tree in the sanctuary is actually known as a "Chrismon Tree." The ornaments are specially made "Monograms of Christ," representations of the wide variety of names and titles of Jesus. There are also other ornaments with Christian symbols. Over 300 Chrismons have been created and cared for faithfully for many years, and we are grateful to those who preserve this amazing tradition. Please take time to study the ornaments up close. You will be amazed by their beauty and understand their sacred significance. A Sunday bulletin insert will describe the various Chrismons.
- The "secret" of our Advent Wreath is revealed! Our Advent wreath hangs from the ceiling. Most Advent wreaths are placed on a table. There is a cord with a hook that drops down from a ceiling beam that we hook the wreath to. This cord goes up over a pulley and down along the ceiling beam toward the rear of the sanctuary. Then it drops down into the usher's closet. Every Christmas we cross our fingers and hope the cord with the hook will drop down as designed because it's a long way up to fix!
- GMUMC once had a "mansard." This is a roofing term describing shingles covering a vertical wall, and ours was located over the west entrance. When our last big hail storm hit in May 2017, the mansard was removed along with the west building skylights. Trustees replaced the mansard area with light-colored metal siding and a United Methodist cross and flame metal sculpture was donated for the area. The skylights had caused heat loss and water leakage problems since originally installed. Hopefully, our 4th set of roof shingles through the years will last a long time since our hail deductible is now at \$50,000! However, GMUMC carries a \$25,000 additional insurance rider for hail, and Trustees established an Insurance Dedicated Reserve of approx. \$28,000 from payments for doing inside water damage repair work themselves. (The water drains on the flat office roof had plugged with all the hail causing wall and rug damage near Meg's office.) Now you know what a "mansard" is!
- Have you read the pew insert explaining our two stained glass windows? Members don't often see our original window at the south end of the west building in the area of the original sanctuary but it is worth going up the ramp to see the beautiful cross on this window.
- The pipe organ we enjoy has a storied history. Organist Donna Baker contributed her salary for 4.5 years, and memorials and donations brought the total fund to \$6,000. A music production, Fiddler on the Roof, brought in \$1,700 and enabled the purchase of a used 8-rank Wicks organ that members of the church found in Chicago. Choir members made a trip to Chicago to transport it back to Lakewood and they refinished the cabinet, and then the organ was installed in the new sanctuary. The organ has been upgraded and repaired since acquiring in 1979, and we now have a hybrid that kept the traditional pipes but added new digital effects to broaden and deepen the organ's various voices.
- Tiny Hearts Academy rents our daycare space. Andy Sunar and his brother own four Tiny Hearts centers. Through the years we have had several daycare renters and a Waldorf School. The daycare has 80 children of which 30 are babies and 50 preschool children. The waiting list for daycare is very long. Tiny Hearts has made several improvements to the space such as new flooring, window air conditioners, paint for their areas and Fellowship Hall. We are very fortunate to have this occupant.
- For several years Lorene Branson had thought the north, front side of the building needed a cross to identify it as a church. She brought the idea to Trustees and in 2019 the large cross on the west building was installed.

- Don't be surprised to see deer visiting the columbarium for a drink at the fountain. During a memorial reception in November 2016, a buck with a nice rack was parading just outside the Fellowship Hall windows!
- During 2019 the Trustees were given funds by a member to upgrade the Fellowship Hall bathrooms. They totally gutted the bathrooms, then installed new tile, stalls, counters, fixtures, mirror and lights, flooring, wallpaper, and paint to totally modernize the restrooms. The total cost of doing it ourselves was a fraction of the professional bid!
- If you use the elevette, remember to close the gate and the door! The elevette won't move up or down for the next customer unless the door and gate are closed, and it's very frustrating to wait and find someone to go up or down to close the doors.

In 2014, Janet Starkey wrote a wonderful article for the newsletter, "The History of Handbells at Green Mountain United Methodist Church". She has updated it for this newsletter, and we thank her for the devotion to our bell choirs and excellence that she has provided through the years.

## THE HISTORY OF HANDBELLS AT GREEN MOUNTAIN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH



Sometime in the early 1990s, two driving forces at GMUMC had the same idea: our church needed a handbell choir. Those two families were Chuck and Barb Thorman, and Ruth and Jerry Cook. The bells were important to Jerry, as when he was a youngster, the handbells played at one particular time at his church. Jerry was intrigued by this instrument, so after the service was over, he went to the bell table and proceeded to pick up and touch one of the bells. At that point, he was reprimanded severely by one of the bell players. This bothered him greatly, that a child was not allowed to touch the bells.

Chuck was instilled with a life-long love of music by his mother, Martha Jane Thorman, who herself loved music. Once, as a child, he was practicing his violin, and proceeded to play some wrong notes. His mother came into the practice room and advised him that he was making some mistakes. He then said something to the effect of "Well, if you can do it better than I, why don't you?", and she then did just that - played it better than the young Chuck! Nice try, Chuck!

In the summer of 1992, the Cooks and the Thormans purchased a 3-octave set of handbells (36 bells) from Schulmerich, one of the only two U.S. handbell manufacturers, based in Pennsylvania. There were two major thoughts: from Jerry, the stipulation that children would be able to play them, as his childhood experience was quite traumatic to him. From Barb, that this project be done **right** (doesn't that sound just like Barb?); the bells were going to be just as important as the chancel choir, and they deserved their own space. (Author's note: I am eternally grateful that they have their own space, as there are many church bell choirs that must set up their space and take it down for each and every rehearsal).

#### HISTORY OF HANDBELLS AT GREEN MOUNTAIN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH (CONT'D)

When the original set of bells were purchased, Vernon Moody was the Chancel Choir director, and since his wife, Cherita Moody, had experience in handbells, she became the first handbell director at GMUMC. Some of the church members who were part of that first handbell group were Jean Arnold, Roberta Bunger, Elizabeth Wypiszynski, Jo Nettleton, Tanya Asplin, Rhonda Renaud, Rich Arnold, Rilene Thompson, Randy Wypiszynski, Ruth Cook, and others. Interesting to note that several of these people are still enjoying playing today! At one point, Cherita "passed the baton" to Gary Sattazahn, who was then followed by John Shannon, then John Polinski, and today, Janet Starkey. Sadly, Cherita passed away in March, 2007.

Throughout the years, the church has been able to add more handbells to the original 3-octave set. The 4th octave was purchased in 1998, and we have been adding bells in bits and pieces since then. For example, in 2004, the Asplin family purchased 2 bells, and in December 2013, contributions for the purchase of several more bells were made by miscellaneous memorial funds, and also by the Lyons, the Kagiyamas, the Arnolds, and Tanya Asplin's mother and sister (both bell ringers in their home state of South Carolina and Georgia). Also, in May of 2014, the bell choir was asked to play for Elizabeth and Randy Wypiszynski's daughter's wedding. Elizabeth and Randy very generously purchased a large bell for the choir to commemorate this joyful event.

To complement the sound of the bells, most bell choirs also have hand chimes, and we were able to purchase a 3-octave set of Schulmerich chimes in 2001, with the 4th octave being added in 2003. In addition, the children in the church have their own group called "Children's' Chimes"; they have their own practice room and their own set of 3-octave chimes. Ruth Cook says that Jerry is in heaven beaming at this.

Of course, in addition to the bells, you also need cases. For a long time, we had a particular bass bell for which we had no case. Instead, we were able to procure a clean 5-gallon paint bucket, and that was where we stored that bell. This bell became known as "the bucket bell". However, with some memorial funds from Gavin Lodge, we were finally able to get a real case for that bell. Today, September 7, 2014, we welcome and bless the final two bells in the GMUMC family of handbells, as these two bells bring us to a total of 5 octaves (61 bells). These bells were able to join the family through the use of funds from the Lowell Mellott memorial, and from the generosity of Joyce Mellott herself.

It may be interesting to note that if the bells were purchased as a set today, in 2014, the cost would be \$24,970, with the chimes costing an additional \$2,890. But most importantly, the bells are an important part of the musical ministry of GMUMC, and they will continue to be long into the future.

Since the original writing of this article back in 2014, we have been able to purchase the fifth octave of hand chimes, bringing the total set to 5 octaves of bells and 5 octaves of chimes. In addition, the Youth Bell choir has their own set of 3 octaves of bells and 3 octaves of chimes. We also have purchased a "bell tree," enabling us to string together a series of bells so that a ringer can perform a solo piece.



### **GMUMC Online Directory**

There are two ways to access the church online directory with pictures of members, their phone numbers, and emails. The church office will need to have put your information into the directory in order for you to open and use directory.

Here are the two methods.

- 1. Go to the church website, <u>gmumc.com</u>, and click on "directory" which is on the bottom bar of the home page. You may either download or open the directory. You will need the church password, so call the church office at 303-989-3727 to obtain the directory password.
- 2. Download the app on your smart phone or tablet: Instant Church Directory by Communication Resources (a yellow church icon). The app will ask for your email address (which must be in the directory), and then you can set a password. You can get the app on Google play, the Kindle store, or the Apple store.



I hope that you've enjoyed your various Dinner for 8 Groups this year. I'll be working on the **Winter January- April 2023** Groups, starting the week of **Dec 26<sup>th</sup>**; this process takes time to do. The Team Leader and members of each group decide what days, times, and places work best for them and set up each dinner together towards the end of the evening. It is a great way to possibly try new cuisines or suggest your favorite & enjoy an evening of Fellowship, especially now that restaurants are opening up again, and there are a few new ones.

New groups are formed every four months, giving you the opportunity to get to know more people. (part of Denver Urban Gardens (DUG) community gardens)

#### "Planting seeds for the future."

The vision: Feeding our community.

"I hope that time spent in the garden can grow not only sustainable food but a community from diverse people and foster a sense of place that brings peace." Lori Osborn

The Garden is *going to bed* for 2022. The plots are empty and beginning to be covered in leaves (sheet composting thanks to your leaf donations). We are celebrating our third successful growing season with every plot under cultivation. We have grown pumpkins (with the Children's Sunday School and Tiny Hearts), Swiss chard, beans, peas, peppers, onions, basil, marigolds, columbines, cosmos, petunias, kale, lettuce, beats, eggplant, arugula, zucchini, sunflowers, zinnias, strawberries, the list goes on.

We fed our neighbors (and ourselves) with vegetables – placing lots of our extra vegies (tomatoes, zucchini, beans, peppers, etc.) in **Bobbie's Blessing Box** during the growing season where they moved into the community within a few hours. Our community has found the Garden! We have participated in beauty and supported our pollinators, and a bee hive colony (no honey for us just yet – the hive needs it to get through the winter) – and many, many rabbits. All are invited to come into the garden for a respite and to just *be present*.

The garden contributed to the healing of one of our 10-year-old gardeners, who had a kidney transplant at Children's Hospital in the spring of 2021. Gabe and his mom moved to a large plot this season where they added a bench and kept some open dirt for Gabe to play in. Gabe's plot is one of our scholarship plots. Gabe's mom writes, in thanks:

"I wanted to thank you so much for the privilege of the garden plot. It brought so much joy to us. We got an amazing herb Harvest; enough to last through the whole winter. When things were at its bleakest, it was beautiful to come out to the garden to see the hope that it provides us."

• Eagle Project #2 Bat Boxes. Brennon Myers with Boy Scout Troop 989 constructed and installed bat boxes on the shade pergola. The Scouts and Leaders signed the boxes with sharpy pens. Come into the garden to see them. (Pictures below)

It can take two-three years for bats to take up residence, but gardeners are accustomed to patient waiting. Thank you to co-garden leaders Ali Young, Stacy Cummins, and Chief Composter Mark Osborn, who helped Brennon and Troop 989 with this wonderful project.

Thank you for the **Fall mulch / leaves** – It takes about 3-4 bags of leaves for each garden plot for sheet composting. And we will be adding leaves through the winter months. Any remaining leaves will be used by Mark and his team of composters to make compost.

### What we need:

**Garden tools** – As you put your own garden to bed – or you are downsizing – please think of the Garden and donate your used hand tools, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc. Any extra tools will be donated to DUG for other Community Gardens.

**Bricks** – The brick fund raiser is still on going. We anticipate installing the bricks in the spring. Lori Osborn or Jean Arnold will be in contact with you if you have not provided the "words" you want on your bricks.

**Donations for scholarship plots.** Two of the plots in the garden are scholarship plots. Thank you for your 2021 donations making these plots possible for gardeners in 2022. The cost to support a scholarship plot is \$50 / plot.

**Garden plots.** If you would like a garden plot for the 2023 growing season, please contact co-garden leader **Ali Young** (mustang.ali@hotmail.com) to be added to the list. We anticipate having 2 plots open up this spring. Once the wait list reaches 10 people, we will close the list until the 2024 growing season.

**Bricks** – We anticipate ordering the bricks in the fall. **Jean Arnold** will be in contact with you if you have not provided the "words" you want on your bricks.

**Fundraising. Community Brick fund raiser** continues. You can order bricks at any time to support the garden. Order forms are on the program table outside the Gathering Place or Jean Arnold can send you a form:

\$100 per 4 X 8 brick + \$10 for clip art; \$200 per 8 X 8 brick + \$10 for clip art.
