

Our guest speakers from International Rescue Committee (IRC Colorado) and Marcia Canter from Arvada UMC & President of our UWFAITH district did a great job. And our own sister in Faith Hamu Chigwada brought tears to my eyes during her blessing on the congregation, relating how much we at our church helped her family when they moved to Colorado.

Between our UWFaith members donations (\$110) and our special collection on April 23 (\$1623), we at Green Mountain UMC have already collected \$1733 - more than half the \$3000 needed to sponsor a family through IRC!

We welcome your donations to sponsor a family! There are envelopes for cash donations - put your name/envelope number on them to credit your giving report. NEW CO-SPONSORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES TO WELCOME REFUGEES

THE CHALLENGE

The war in Ukraine, coupled with the change of government in Afghanistan and the many persistant crises around the world, has pushed the number of people forced to flee conflict, violence and persecution over the staggering milestone of 100 million. The U.S. government responded to this past year's crises by welcoming 76,000 people forced to flee Afghanistan—the largest evacuation of its kind since the Vietnam War—and committing to accepting 100,000 refugees from Ukraine, as well as raising the refugee resettlement ceiling to 125,000 for fiscal year 2022.

Before the Refugee Act of 1980, refugee resettlement in the U.S. was largely conducted privately or through community groups. The act standardized the process and today most refugees in the U.S. are primarily welcomed through resettlement agencies, such as the International Rescue Committee.

There have always been American communities eager to step up to welcome newcomers. However, beginning with the Syrian refugee crisis in 2015 and continuing today as people flee Afghanistan and Ukraine, more local community groups have been offering their help. The IRC and other resettlement agencies have responded to this enthusiasm by integrating community sponsorship at the local and national levels

BECOME A CO-SPONSOR

Co-sponsorship is a form of community sponsorship available to groups located within 100 miles of participating local IRC offices. These groups provide clearly defined financial and in-kind contributions as well as services for a refugee family, while their efforts are overseen by the local IRC office.

As a co-sponsor, you have the potential to significantly enhance a refugee family's quality of life, including by helping them find better employment opportunities, assisting them with learning English, offering social support and connecting them to opportunities for civic engagement. The services you would provide alongside a local IRC office could include:

- . Securing a safe, sanitary and affordable housing unit for the family that is available for at least 6-12 months;
- Ensuring housing is equipped with appropriate household items;
- · Greeting and welcoming the family at the airport;
- · Providing food and items for basic needs;
- · Connecting adults to English classes and employment services;
- · Assisting in the gathering of personal identification documents;
- Enrolling minors in school;
- · Connecting to cultural orientation and integration services;
- Linking to employment services;
- · Facilitating medical follow up and transportation;
- · Writing case notes and maintaining case file documentation.

GMUMC Online Directory

There are two ways to access the church online directory with pictures of members, their ne numbers, and emails. The church office will need to have put your information into the directory in order for you to open and use directory.

Here are the two methods.

- 1. Go to the church website, <u>gmumc.com</u>, and click on "directory" which is on the bottom bar of the home page. You may either download or open the directory. You will need the church password, so call the church office at 303-989-3727 to obtain the directory password.
- 2. Download the app on your smart phone or tablet: Instant Church Directory by Communication Resources (a yellow church icon). The app will ask for your email address (which must be in the directory), and then you can set a password. You can get the app on Google play, the Kindle store, or the Apple store.

LifeSpark Cancer Resources is a Colorado non-profit organization that uses Reiki and Healing Touch wellness therapies to bring peace and healing to individuals with cancer. Sessions are offered at partner locations including hospitals, spas, and churches, as well as remote locations. For many years Green Mtn. UMC has hosted LifeSpark massage sessions in a room opposite the church nursery in the lower west building.

How LifeSpark Sessions Work:

- *LifeSpark* wellness therapies promote peace and healing on all levels.
- Adults 18 and over with cancer are eligible: any type or stage of cancer.
- Receive 8 weeks of healing sessions, scheduled at a time convenient for you.
- You'll be matched with an experienced healing touch or Reiki provider.
- Caregivers are eligible (family members who take care of a cancer patient)
- *LifeSpark* is a free program.
- LifeSpark sessions last about an hour.
- LifeSpark sessions do not replace medical care, but rather support you during and after cancer treatment.

News from the Cedar Hill Community Garden

The garden is part of Denver Urban Gardens (DUG) community gardens. Note: the garden is always unlocked so feel free to visit at any time.

The vision: Feeding our community. "I hope that time spent in the garden can grow not only sustainable food but a community from diverse people and foster a sense of place that brings peace." Lori Osborn.

The Garden is *starting to wake up* for 2023. The plots are empty, but you will soon see the gardeners digging in the leaves donated by many of you in the fall, used as sheet composting over the winter months. The leaves will also be used to cover the plots once planted and extras used to make compost as "browns" during the growing season – nothing goes to waste.

Garden Plots. We are starting our fourth growing season in 2023, and all of our plots have been spoken for with a wait list of 11 requests for plots. We held our first gardeners' meeting two weeks ago. Our first garden work day will be Saturday, May 20th.

Bees. Our bees did not survive the -20° weather. We have an Eagle Scout from Boy Scout Troop 989 working with Ali to improve the weather protection for the hives. Ali and her bee keepers will reestablish the hives this Spring. If you would like to learn about bee keeping or help with the hives, contact Ali (<u>mustang.ali@hotmail.com</u>) for more information. You do not have to have a plot in the garden to work with Ali and her team of beekeepers.

What we need:

- **Garden tools** As you begin work in your gardens, downsize or clean out your garages and sheds please think of the Garden and donate your used hand tools, rakes, shovels, wheelbarrows, etc. Any extra tools will be donated to DUG for other Community Gardens.
- **Bricks** The brick fund raiser is still on going. **Jean Arnold** will be placing the brick order at the beginning of April with a 6-8 week delivery for bricks. I have contacted some of you to finalize the "words" for your bricks. This is an ongoing fund raiser so if you would like a brick in the garden and did not originally order, let Jean know (jeanarnold@arnoldarnold.com).
- **Donations for scholarship plots.** Two of the plots in the garden are scholarship plots. Thank you for your 2022 donations making these plots possible for gardeners in 2023. The cost to support a scholarship plot is \$50 / plot.

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
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CHILDREN'S DEPARTMENT
