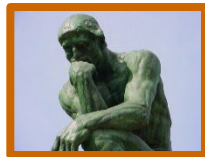

Thanks to all who stayed after church on Grubby Sunday to work. A lot was accomplished.

Here are some of the activities folks did to keep the building and grounds looking good:

Our solar system has been installed on the east and west side roofs of the West Building, which consists of 185 solar panel and is designed to produce 100% of the church's electric needs. This project was paid for by our Endowment Fund.



BOBBI'S BLESSING BOX

Bobbi's Blessing Box was inspired by my sister. She envisioned a place where people could pick up food items to get them through a rough patch. She had read about them online, where they are like the little libraries you see in neighborhoods.

Just a few days before she died, several of us discussed what an amazing outreach this could be for our church. Then when we found her sketches of a free-standing food pantry with the words, "Feed the Body Feed the Soul," we knew we had to make it happen.

Thanks to Mike & Christie Lyons and Greg & Peter Montano (along with many people behind the scenes), we have this beautiful box that helps our neighbors.

When the box was first installed, there was about a two-week turnover rate. The turn-over rate is less than a day now. The word is out that it is here to help, AND the need is great. Please bring food and put it in the box whenever you can, possibly a little each time you shop. If you wanted to have a food drive at your place of work, we could certainly use the extra food.

Thank you for helping honor Bobbi's vision of helping our neighbors.

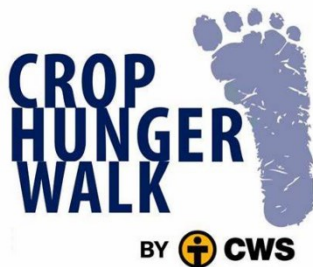

Our GMUMC Chapel

Many of us rarely get to the upper south end of the West Building where our Youth and Children’s classrooms are located to visit our chapel. The south end of the West Building was built in 1965, and the first service was held there on Christmas. The building was consecrated by Bishop R. Marvin Stuart on April 17, 1966. This first unit of our church building cost approximately \$90,000. This upper level of our first building served as our sanctuary until the East Building was erected in 1979.

A beautiful stained glass window was behind the altar and remains there today. The top circle symbolizes God and Eternity – without beginning or ending. The cross denotes Christ over all. The second circle symbolizes creation. It is not closed denoting this is an ongoing process. The dove in this circle is a symbol of Peace. The sunburst is a symbol of Hope. The triangle represents the Trinity – Father, Son, Holy Ghost. The Phoenix bird, rising from the ashes, is a symbol of new life and resurrection. The mountain peaks remind us of the Sermon on the Mount and of our church on Green Mountain.

Recently there was a wedding held in the chapel. There has also been an organ donated for the area. Consider using the chapel for small ceremonies or meditation or come to study the stained glass window and its symbolism.

GMUMC Online Directory

Here are instructions on how to access the church online directory with pictures of members, their phone numbers, and emails. The church office will need to have put your information into the directory in order for you to open and use directory.

Go to the **App Store**. Search for “**Instant Church Directory**.” It is a **yellow icon** with a white church. **Install**.

Create Login by giving your email in the directory and creating a password. If your email is not in the directory, you will need to send the church office a message to add it to the directory.

Instant Church Directory will then send you an email asking you to confirm you are in directory by again asking for your email and password in that email.

The **Directory** will then pop up on your screen and you can begin searching for telephone numbers, etc.

When you close the directory you will find the **Instant Church Directory icon** on your screen. To access the directory, just put in your email and password.

LifeSpark Cancer Resources

LifeSpark Cancer Resources is a Colorado non-profit organization that uses Reiki and Healing Touch wellness therapies to bring peace and healing to individuals with cancer. Sessions are offered at partner locations including hospitals, spas, and churches, as well as remote locations. **For many years Green Mtn. UMC has hosted LifeSpark massage sessions in a room opposite the church nursery in the lower west building.**

How LifeSpark Sessions Work:

- **LifeSpark** wellness therapies promote peace and healing on all levels.
- Adults 18 and over with cancer are eligible: any type or stage of cancer.
- Receive 8 weeks of healing sessions, scheduled at a time convenient for you.
- You'll be matched with an experienced healing touch or Reiki provider.
- Caregivers are eligible (*family members who take care of a cancer patient*)
- **LifeSpark** is a free program.
- **LifeSpark** sessions last about an hour.
- **LifeSpark** sessions do not replace medical care, but rather support you during and after cancer treatment.

The garden is part of Denver Urban Gardens (DUG) community gardens. Please feel free to visit at any time.

The Vision: Feeding our community. “I hope that time spent in the garden can grow not only sustainable food but a community from diverse people and foster a sense of place that brings peace.” Lori Osborn

Eagle Scout Project 2024: This Fall Eagle Candidate William Renz’s project is: **Cedar Hill hive revive.** Will is leading BS Troop 342 to rebuild the bee hives, including a foundation, wind break and fencing.

The garden had beehives from 2020 until their collapse in 2022 in the sudden drop in temperatures in October/November 2022 – coupled with high winds and wind chill. Co-garden leader Ali Young, a bee keeper herself, will work to find a swarm or we may use funds raised by the brick sales to re-queen the hive in Spring 2025 – within the infrastructure built by Will and the Scouts.

What we need:

- **Garden tools** – Consider donating your old tools. Any extra tools will be donated to DUG for other Community Gardens.
- **Donations for scholarship plots** – **Thank you for your past generosity.** Two of the plots in the garden are scholarship plots. Thank you for your 2023/2024 donations making these plots possible for gardeners. The cost to support a scholarship plot is \$50 / plot. The Cedar Hill garden also boasts some of the lowest plot fees in the DUG network thanks to your support, this allows our community members to garden and grow food for their families.

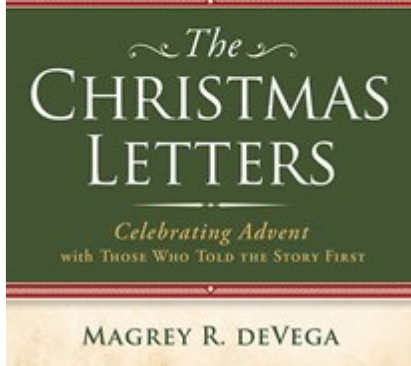

Our annual Church Conference is scheduled for Sunday, Dec. 1 @ 12 p.m. (noon) following the worship service. All are welcome to attend:



Annual meetings are important in the life of a church family. Paragraph 247.3 in the Book of Discipline requires each church to hold a conference annually to review and evaluate the ministry of the church, receive reports, and adopt goals recommended by the church council for next year. Working with the DS, each church can call a church or charge conference for this work. A *charge* conference is the basic governing body of the local church and is comprised of the church council (administrative board or leadership team) and all retired clergy within the local church, while a *church* conference invites broader participation with all members having the right to attend and vote. Pastors are invited to consult with their DS to determine the appropriate conference setting for each context (charge conference, church conference, multiple point charges in one unified or multiple meetings, or a circuit conference, etc.).

What follows is a basic outline of an agenda for 2024 Charge/Church Conferences, including required elements. Look this over with the pastor and lay leadership, then determine the format that makes sense in your setting. Church Conference meetings may be held in-person or online depending on what is contextually appropriate for your church.
