

History of Handbells at GMUMC

Sometime in the early 1990s, two driving forces at GMUMC had the same idea: our church needed a handbell choir. Those two families were Chuck and Barb Thorman, and Ruth and Jerry Cook. The bells were important to Jerry, as when he was a youngster, the handbells played at one particular time at his church. Jerry was intrigued by this instrument, so after the service was over, he went to the bell table and proceeded to pick up and touch one of the bells. At that point, he was reprimanded severely by one of the bell players. This bothered him greatly, that a child was not allowed to touch the bells.



Chuck was instilled with a life-long love of music by his mother, Martha Jane Thorman, who herself loved music. Once, as a child, he was practicing his violin, and proceeded to play some wrong notes. His mother came into the practice room and advised him that he was making some mistakes. He then said something to the effect of, "Well, if you can do it better than I, why don't you?", and she then did just that—played it better than the young Chuck! Nice try, Chuck!

In the summer of 1992, the Cooks and the Thormans purchased a 3-octave set of handbells (37 bells) from Schulmerich, one of the only two U.S. handbell manufacturers, based in Pennsylvania. There were two major thoughts: from Jerry, the stipulation that children would be able to play them, as his childhood experience was quite traumatic to him. From Barb, that this project be done right; the bells were going to be just as important as the chancel choir, and they deserved their own space. (Author's note: I am eternally grateful that they have their own space, as there are many church bell choirs that must set up their space and take it down for each and every rehearsal).

When the original set of bells were purchased, Vernon Moody was the chancel choir director, and since his wife Cherita Moody had experience in handbells, she became the first handbell director at GMUMC. Some of the church members who were part of that first handbell group were Jean Arnold, Roberta Bunger, Elizabeth Wypiszynski, Tanya Asplin, Rhonda Renaud, Rich Arnold, Rilene Thompson, Randy Wypiszynski, Ruth Cook, and others. Interesting to note that several of these people are still enjoying playing today! At one point, Cherita "passed the baton" to Gary Sattazahn, who was then followed by John Shannon, then John Polinski, and then Janet Starkey.

Throughout the years, the church has been able to add more handbells to the original 3-octave set. The 4th octave was purchased in 1998, and we have been adding bells in bits and pieces since then. For example, in 2004, the Asplin family purchased 2 bells, and in December 2013, contributions for the purchase of several more bells were made by miscellaneous memorial funds, and also by the Lyons, the Kagiyamas, the Arnolds, and Tanya Asplin's mother and sister (both bell ringers at that time in their home state of South Carolina and Georgia). Also, in May of 2014, the bell choir was asked to play for Elizabeth and Randy Wypiszynski's daughter's wedding. Elizabeth and Randy very generously purchased a large bell for the choir to commemorate this joyful event. We currently have a complete 5-octave set, which is 61 bells.

To complement the sound of the bells, most bell choirs also have handchimes, and we were able to purchase a 5-octave set of Schulmerich chimes over time. In addition, the Youth Bell choir have their own practice room and their own set of 3-octave bells and chimes.

It may be interesting to note that if the bells and chimes were purchased as a set today, in 2025, the cost would be \$49,750. But most importantly, the bells are an important part of the musical ministry of GMUMC, and they will continue to be long into the future.

recently returned from our overnight road trip (August 22-23) to visit Amache and Sand Creek Massacre National Historic Sites. These 2 sites are both located relatively close together in southeast Colorado.

We were blessed to have John Hopper give us the tour of Amache Museum in Granada. He led

> his students over the past 30+ years to bring Amache's history alive and build a museum of its ~1700 artifacts, which led to it to being designated a National Historic Site. We also were blessed with wonderful National Park

We stayed overnight in Lamar - it was the largest town between these two sites.

It was a typically hot summer day Friday afternoon when we toured Amache so we got a tiny taste of how awful it must have been to live there during the summer. The weather was kind to us Saturday when we toured Sand Creek Massacre site Saturday - it was overcast and relatively cool!

We learned a lot about these tragic injustices that took place in our state on this very meaningful road trip. And we had fun hanging out with the wonderful Women in Faith plus family & friends!

Both of these National Historical Sites are on land that was traveled by the Cheyenne, Ute, and Arapaho Indigenous people for centuries. I acknowledge this land, this place, is the ancestral home where the people hunted and traveled. The Cheyenne Ute, and Arapaho people are not a people of the past. They are a people of the present.


